
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Use Online Assessments to Identify Interesting Careers



Visit the Career One Stop to Explore Careers that Match Your Interests (maintained by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment, and Training).
<http://careeronestop.org>

- Select **Explore Careers** from main menu bar.
- Select **Self Assessments**; Select **Interest Assessment**;
- Under **“Take an Interest Assessment”**:
 - To take a short interest assessment, select **“Interest Assessment”**, and then **“Start Assessment”**. Indicate your interest level for each activity, from strongly dislike to strongly like.
 - Your RIASEC score will be automatically calculated based upon your responses.
 - Occupations that match your interests are listed from “best match” to “least match”.
 - On the left hand column, you can filter down your results based on the “Experience or education needed” or the occupations that match “best” vs. “least”.
 - Select an occupation for a brief snapshot of that occupation. Note the “Related Occupations” list on the left.
 - Select the links to “See more wages”, “Find job openings”, “Find local training”, or “More tasks”.
 - Click the “download” button on the bottom of the page if you want to save this occupation snapshot.
- **For a more in-depth Interest Assessment**, return to **Explore Careers** from main menu bar, **Self-Assessments**, **Interest Assessment**, and under **“Take an Interest Assessment,”** select **“O*NET Interest Profiler on My Next Move.”**
 - Indicate your interest level for each activity, review your RIASEC score, and check out the occupations that match your interests.
- **For more opportunities to explore careers based on your interests**, click on the **“MY NEXT MOVE”** logo at the top left of the page.
 - Explore career options by searching careers with key words or browsing careers by industry.
- The next page provides information on how to explore careers and occupations more in-depth, assessing the skills, knowledge, abilities, education, and training required, and short and long-term trends.

Research National, State, & Local Occupation and Industry Trends

- Select **Explore Careers** from main menu bar.
- Select **Learn About Careers**; Select **Career Profiles**; Select **Occupation Profile**.
- On left hand menu, **Occupation Information**:
 - If you are a veteran, select **Military to Civilian Occupation Translator**.
 - Select **MOC Code, Keyword, or Menu** to conduct a search.
 - Select **Fastest Growing Occupations**.
 - Select **Education Level: Overall** and **Continue**. View top 50 occupations in the country.
 - Select the **State** and **Continue** to view top 50 occupations in a specific state.
 - Select an Occupation.
 - At the bottom of the Occupation Profile, you will see a box labeled **Modify Occupation Profile**, **Select All**, and **Update** to see the complete profile for this occupation.
 - To research the salary forecasts for an occupation, under **State and National Wages**, select:
 - **Median Wage by Occupation Across States**
 - **Compare Wages by Occupation and Local Area**
 - **Compare Wages by Metropolitan Areas**
 - To research the employment trends, under **State and National Trends**, select:
 - **Employment Trends by Occupation Across States**
 - **Compare Employment Trends by Occupation**
- Scroll to the top of the Occupation Profile page to return to the Occupation Information Menu at the top left:
 - Select **Most Openings or Highest Paying Occupations**:
 - Select **Education Level: Overall** and **Continue**. View top 50 occupations in the country.
 - Select the **State** and **Continue** to view top 50 occupations in a specific state.
 - Select an Occupation.
- Scroll to the top of the Occupation Profile page to return to the Occupation Information Menu at the top left:
 - Select **Occupation Profile** from the menu.
 - Use either the Keyword Search or Menu Search to find an occupation of interest to you.
 - If you use the Keyword Search, the site will return the occupational titles that most closely match the keywords you used. Select the **Occupational Title** you want and **Continue**.
 - Select the **State** and **Continue**.
 - Check out the employment and salary forecasts for an occupation by following the instructions above, detailed under "**Fastest Growing Occupations**".
- Scroll to the top of the Occupation Profile page to return to the Column Menu at the top left:
 - Select **Career Tools** from the menu:
 - Select **Business Finder**. Search employers by Industry, Occupation, Location (the easiest to use), or Keyword to find companies that you may want to research to identify whether they could have an opportunity that would fit with your Career Plan.

At the **Career One Stop**, you can research education and training providers offering programs in your local area and throughout the United States. You can search by occupation, institution name, instructional program, keyword, and geographical area.

1. On the main menu, select **Find Training**.
2. In the search box, **Find Local Training**, enter an occupation, school, or program, along with a city, state, or zip code.
3. To research the cost of training and financial aid options, on the left hand menu, select **Pay for Training**.
4. Select **Net Price Calculator** to use a tool to assess the cost of attendance at a university or college.

Research Federal Student Aid (FSA) Opportunities

Federal Student Aid is the comprehensive source for free information from the U.S. Department of Education for preparing for and funding education beyond high school. This site provides extensive information on a variety of grant, campus-based aid, and loan programs for students pursuing a postsecondary education. Each program has specific eligibility requirements, funding amounts, application requirements, disbursements procedures, and payback requirements (for loans). Federal Student Aid is a valuable, user-friendly site designed to walk you through the process easily!





Use Job Boards & Search Engines to Research Trends in Job Opportunities



Omnibus Search Engines to Search Thousands of Job Boards & Company Websites

SimplyHired.com and Indeed.com are search engines which will scour the Internet looking for job postings on over 3,000 job boards, such as Monster.com and CareerBuilder.com, PLUS company/organization websites. In some cases, if you see a position of interest on SimplyHired.com or Indeed.com, you may be able to read the full job posting and apply for the position through these sites. In other cases, you may find a brief description of the opening with a link you to the job board or website where the full job posting is located. In this case, you may have to register with the job board (providing your email address and a password) in order to see the full job posting.

These sites can be helpful in researching the wording of job titles, the types of open positions available in a certain geographical area, salary ranges being offered, etc. Be sure to utilize the **Advanced Search** features (located to the right of the **“Find/Search All Jobs”** button at the top of the page after the first search results are returned). In addition, the column to the left of the search results provides extremely helpful ways to **Refine Your Search** instantaneously.

NOTES:
